5 minutes in length
oral presentation with visual component

Introduction to Your I S S U E

- Urgency (why it matters)
- Scope (who it affects)
- Severity (how bad it is)

Brief summary of HISTORY

- Provide some of the main events or causes of your problem
- What that makes it especially pressing today
- Keep it simple: not too many events

Presentation of SOLUTIONS

- What does it involve?
- How does or would it address your problem (causes, coverage, feasibility, comparison)?
- Who supports it (experts, interest groups, organizations)?

Your ARGUMENT

- Make a claim about which of these solutions will work best
- Explain why that solution would work better than others
- Anything else is up to you

Powerpoint / Photos / Videos / Graphs / Audio clips

Dress comfortably (whatever that means)

Use notecards or a prepared speech (or a powerpoint)

Be prepared on the day you're scheduled

Don't stress out – these are informal in nature

Include 1 quote from Zarembka and 1 from an additional source for each question (2 quotes each; 8 total)
